## Annual Plant Sale, May 31: Plants and People Needed!

Location is next to St. Stephens and across from the post office. Once you have unloaded your car, please move it somewhere around the Congregational church or up by the Town Hall Theater so other members can unload and so the public will have a place to park.

This is the fundraiser that provides the money for all of our activities, grants, and scholarships. Each member is expected to donate a minimum of 8 plants. Larger plants in big pots bring more money. We sell nothing in a pot smaller than 4".

You can bring the following: vegetable starts, annual plant starts, herbs, perennials from your garden or a friend's garden such as daylilies, peonies, daisies, echinacea (coneflower), ground covers, grasses, chrysanthemums, small shrubs such as hydrangeas, nine bark, smoke tree, fruit (raspberries, strawberries).

All plants must be tagged with name and color of the flower. If you know, indicate sun or shade and approximate height. A cut-up milk jug is a good source for a label.

Please pot early, like now, so that the plant is settled in and looks good. If you need pots, please call Marilyn. If you do not have plants to divide, please consider starting some from seed or contact another garden club member to see if you can help them divide their perennials.

You may also bring items for the Garden Accessories Table: nice pots, tools in good shape, gardening books, and other garden items.

All hands on deck are needed in order to accomplish this event. Plants must be there by 7:30am. At 7am, we need a strong member to pound in Plant Identification signs and another two strong members to set up tables.

On the Thursday before the sale, two members are needed to get the signs from Barbara Pelton and to put them up around town.

This is a great event for everyone. There are some fabulous plants for you to buy once the sale is open to the public.

**PRING** is comeback time.

I just finished a biography about Louie Zamperini. He was a young track star in the 1936 Berlin Olympics and then a bombardier in the Pacific theater in WWII. Here's a short version of what happened to him.

He was on a B-24 bomber on a search and rescue mission. They lost an engine, then two and crashed in the ocean. He was one of only three crew that survived the crash. They drifted in a life raft for 47 days barely surviving on fish and rainwater and floated to Japan. They became prisoners of war and many starved to death. All were mistreated. One of the guards took notice of the famous athlete and made it his mission to break him. He almost did. By the end of the war Louie was very near death. For years after the war he suffered terrible PTSD and alcoholism.

But he recovered and enjoyed a good life of 97 years. The book and movie is called Unbroken. Worth your time.

This incredible comeback story puts many things in context. Things that look dead are just waiting for the end of winter or war. Because it's also in our nature to come back. Overcome wrongs. Get on with life. And garden.
